This fall the Pen Bay Sailing League (PBSL) held races with A and B Divisions on 3/4 mile courses across the midcoast in Rockland, MDI, Boothbay and Castine.

The Islesboro Central School team had mixed results over the season as our young team gained experience in fall waters. Some highlights: PBSL #1 (in Rockland): ICS was 6th of 8. PBSL #2 (aka the "Boothbay Drifter" with no wind): ICS was 4th of 8. PBSL #3 (at MDI with winds 8 to 20 knots): Alma Bewsher placed 2nd in two races and ICS came in 2nd overall.

In the Becton Cup in Castine, Alma Bewsher and Samantha Conover placed 4th out of 19 sailors! This annual regatta (also known as the Girls' Doublehanded State Championship) is open to regional middle school and high school girls who sail for their team throughout the season. The Becton Cup was a 1st class event hosted by the MMA Team, with coaches Peter and Patrick DiLalla making it all happen. The future of ICS Sailing is looking bright!
